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Bilingualism SIG Forum: From ESL Learner to ESL **Educator: Changing Identities of a TESOL** Practitioner

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ABSTRACT

Some people view language learning as a practical gain, and others consider it as selftransformation; in the recent view of Second Language Acquisition (SLA) and sociolinguistics, the identities of language learners and teachers have been a focal topic. This autoethnography illustrates my own journey as an English as a Second Language (ESL) student and how my identity has changed from a monolingual Japanese teenager to a multilingual and multicultural Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL) practitioner. My experience of wanting to escape the first language (L1) community and being marginalized in an Englishspeaking community made me reject my L1 culture to belong to the target community. Not until I learned the significance of my identity as Japanese did I realize my multilingual and multicultural self. This article also

discusses how it affects my teaching philosophy, emphasizing the importance of noticing changing identities in language acquisition.

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
