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Background

English Vocabulary in the Course of Study (2021)

- Course of Study (2021) defines the national curriculum guidelines in Japan.
- High school English textbooks were revised in 2021 based on the Course of Study (2021).
- The vocabulary was not controlled.
 - No clear guidelines on vocabulary.
 - No minimum vocabulary requirement.

Previous Studies

- Textbooks based on the previous guideline mainly covered vocabulary from the *New General Service List (NGSL)*, but their lexical range was limited, with only 12–38% of NGSL words appearing in the textbooks (Nakayama, 2022).
- One Japanese high school textbook series, for example, covered about 91.2% of the National Center Test vocabulary, indicating sufficient exam preparation (Tani, 2008).

Research Questions

- To what extent is there variation among the new textbook series in the amount and range of vocabulary they include?
- To what extent do the new textbook series cover the vocabulary used in the *Kyotsu Test* (the exam for University Admissions)?

Materials & Methods

Corpora

- Textbooks
 - Textbooks for English Communication I, II, and III (ECI, ECII, ECIII)
 - 70 MEXT-approved English textbooks published by 12 publishers in 24 series (Book 1–3, though two series have only 2 volumes).
 - Sections: Reading and Optional reading
- Tests
 - Entrance exam reading sections (main and supplementary) from the *Kyotsu Test* (2021–2025): 10 sets

Word Lists for Coverage Calculation

Five vocabulary lists were selected to represent four categories: basic, academic, test-related, and vocabulary for L2 learners.

Procedure & Software

- Step 1: A corpus of the bounds of 70 MEXT-approved English textbooks was created using *FileMaker Pro 2024*.
- Step 2: The corpus was lemmatized using *TagAnt* (Anthony, 2024).
- Step 3: Word lists were generated using *AntConc* (Anthony, 2024).
- Step 4: Vocabulary coverage was calculated using multiple wordlists (cf. Table 2).

$$\text{Coverage [\%]} = \frac{\text{Textbook word types in Word List}}{\text{Word List size}} \times 100$$

Results

Comparison of word types and tokens by textbook series

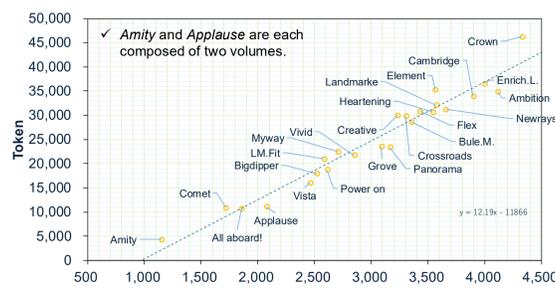
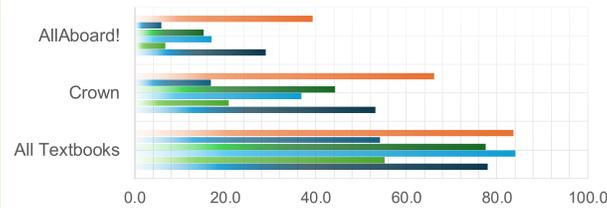


Figure 3: Token-Relationship

- Tokens and types are correlated. ($r=0.98$)
- Crown* had the most types and tokens
- All Aboard!* had the fewest tokens.
 - ΔTokens: 35,474

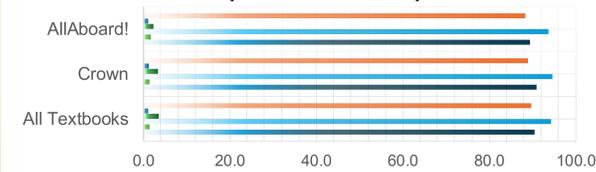

Vocabulary Less Likely to Appear in Textbooks

- Abstract, academic, or technical terms
- Words related to society, politics, medicine, or business
- Archaic or formal expressions
- Less frequent vocabulary items

Discussion

- Large differences in vocabulary size and coverage among textbooks
 - Teachers can select materials suited to students' needs, but such differences may affect students' vocabulary knowledge.
- All textbooks show high NGSL coverage and low UWL/NAWL coverage
 - NGSL is a useful measure for evaluating textbooks.
 - Differences in the number of NGSL types and the proportion of NGSL tokens may lead to differences in vocabulary acquisition among L2 learners.
- In *All Aboard!*, overall coverage exceeds 80% in tokens for the NGSL, but Type coverage is around 40%, indicating a limited range of basic vocabulary exposure.
 - Supplemental materials should be provided according to students' future paths.
- Words not appearing in the textbooks
 - Textbook development may prioritize high frequency and practical vocabulary.

Conclusion

- The analysis of multiple vocabulary lists suggests that the NGSL can serve as an indicator for evaluating textbook vocabulary.
 - The NGSL is also an effective list for L2 learners.
- Existing textbooks do not adequately support acquisition of academic or technical vocabulary.
 - Supplemental materials and instruction are essential.

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
